#### Something to Think About...

When Bro. Johnny sent me the rough draft of the newsletter to prepare it for the website and digital distribution, he added the note to "write us a good Christmas story". One of the first ones that springs to mind apart from the traditional ones everyone knows is a story from a little book and recording set I had when I was just in elementary school as a kid. The original is called Spirit of Christmas by Marilyn Berry. However, due to space, you will get the abridged synopsis here.

Once upon a time... (No, it doesn't actually start that way) there was an old and good king but the time had come for him to pass the throne to his son, the prince. The king was proud of his son and all that he had learned about ruling the people but still felt the young man needed to pass one final test before assuming the throne. The king told him of the importance of Christmas in their land and that there was a very important lesson at the heart of Christmas and that he must find the true spirit of Christmas as his final test to be king.

The prince got right on it and asked an old sage about it who had been a helpful advisor in the past. The sage said he couldn't answer that question so easily but told him there was a person who could give him the answer he sought. The sage told him that to find this person he would need to follow the river to where it meets the sea (three days' journey). He must travel alone and bring three gifts with him: a heavy cloak, a sack of food, and a bag of gold. When he found the beggar at the place where the river meets the sea, he would give him the three gifts and receive his answer.

The young prince began right away and traveled all day and as night was falling he met an old hermit huddled by a fire. The old hermit offered to share his fire and when the young prince inquired as to if he had a cloak to keep warm, the old man said that he didn't have enough money for one and work had been scarce. He knew he needed the heavy cloak to find his answer, but he was moved with compassion that this old hermit needed it more and gave it to him.

The second day of his journey he came upon a mother with many small children that was selling small wreaths of Christmas holly in an attempt to provide food for her children. After looking over the situation, the prince knew even if they sold every wreath they had it wouldn't be enough to feed so many children. He thought of his sack of food and while struggling with the thought of losing another of the gifts he needed, he decided the woman and her family needed the sack of food more.

When he had just started out on the third day of his journey, he saw a young man struggling to pull a cart of vegetables down the path.
